Mae Tao Clinic Annual Report 1995

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Introduction


Mae Tao Clinic is located 4 km south of the Moei River, opposite Mya Wa Di, a Burmese border town. It was established in February 1989 to provide medical care for Burmese students who fled to the Thai-Burma border in 1988. The clinic set up a hospital referral system with the Mae Sot Government Hospital to provide treatment for seriously ill patients, most of whom have complicated malaria. The clinic also serves as a convalescence center for those not healthy enough to return to their camps in Kaw Thoo Lei State (Karen controlled area).

In early 1990, the clinic expanded medical services for the internally displaced refugees from Kaw Thoo Lei State. Civil clinic and mobile medical teams were established, both of which generated high numbers of patient referrals to Mae Tao Clinic. Gradually Mae Tao Clinic became known to illegal Burmese immigrants in Thailand. The military, political, and economic situation in Burma forced many Burmese people to move to other countries to seek a better life. Since the number of Burmese people in Thailand increases day by day, Mae Tao Clinic provides medical care for more and more people. In addition to providing acute inpatient and outpatient care, the clinic also provides maternal child care. This report summarizes the activity of the clinic during 1995.

Current Medical Services

1. Inpatient and Outpatient Care.

The following graph and table summarizes inpatient and outpatient care given in 1995. Peak volumes were seen from July through September. Malaria was greatest during May and June, while Acute Respiratory Infections were greatest during August and September. Acute Diarrheal Disease (dysentery, viral gastroenteritis, and parasitic infections) peaked in the month of May.

3. Maternal-Child Health Care.

In 1994, regular prenatal care and delivery services were established. Currently 10 to 15 deliveries are done each month. In 1996, family planning clinic and immunization services are being expanded. The following table summarizes prenatal test results for 1995.

Activities for 1996 and Beyond

This year Mae Tao Clinic has expanded its Maternal-Child care programs. Through the prenatal program, women with high-risk pregnancies (e.g. complicated by malaria) are referred to Mae Sot Hospital for management. Women with uncomplicated pregnancies are monitored and delivered at the clinic. Those who are unimmunized against Tetanus are vaccinated. The family planning program counsels patients and distributes contraceptives (oral contraceptive pills, condoms, depo-provera) which are provided by Mae Sot Hospital. When appropriate, patients are referred to Mae Sot Hospital for free vasectomy and tubal ligation. The hospital also donates DPT, OPV, MMR, and BCG vaccine to the clinic for the childhood immunization program. This year the clinic has also started a primary eye care clinic which screens children for vitamin A deficiency and other vision problems.

Future plans for Mae Tao clinic include more preventive care efforts. More regular patient health education programs will be established. Nutrition education and malnutrition screening will also be implemented.
